Her department is the liaison and staff to the Planning Commission, Board of Zoning Adjustment, Villages Design Review Committee and the Board of Landscape Design. Dana has been very instrumental in the planning, land use, sign regulations and sustainability of our community. Due to her efforts and passion, we became the first BEE City USA community in Alabama and a Monarch Waystation, all as part of the City's ongoing efforts to create and protect native plant habitats, and to

provide valuable resources to the general public via the City's website.

Johnny Franklin is the Supervisor of the Rightof-Way Division in our Public Works Department. His crews maintain our streets, traffic signs, traffic signals, grass mowing, street banners and the maintenance and upkeep of our commercial villages including the landscaping and Christmas decorations. Because of Johnny and his men, we

have an extremely attractive community, villages and streets. During the garbage crisis with Waste Management three years ago, his Division rented some garbage trucks and greatly assisted in keep it from



becoming a public health issue. Johnny has been with the City for 26 years.

Mountain Brook Has Its **Own Crisis Hotline**

ountain Brook now has its own crisis hotline. COVID brought to the forefront just how often people find themselves in stressful situations. When you, or someone you know, is under extreme stress, what can you do? What should you do? In the past, many people have not had a good answer to these questions. But now, through a partnership between the City of Mountain Brook, Mountain Brook Schools, and ALL IN Mountain Brook, you now have the resources you need anytime, day or night. Add this phone number to your cell contact list: (205) 927-2837. This is our new crisis hotline that is manned twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, by trained crisis management counselors. These counselors are

trained to support, de-escalate, and provide local resources to the caller.

Since COVID, there has been an increase in the trends of anxiety, depression, and mental health needs causing many national crisis hotlines to become overwhelmed, resulting in long wait times to speak with a counselor. Our hotline was developed to help solve this problem while responding on a 'local' basis. The caller controls what information is shared with the counselor. For minor students. Mountain Brook Schools may serve as a resource to connect parents to appropriate resources.

E-Waste and Paper Shredding Day

The City of Mountain Brook will hold its 4th annual electronic waste and paper shredding day this spring. The event is expected to be held sometime in April at Mountain Brook High School. The past three years of this event have seen more than 43,000 lbs. of paper and 62,000 lbs. of electronics being delivered for disposal which is a testament to the community's commitment to sustainable practices.

The event will feature a drive thru drop off and volunteers will help remove items from residents' vehicles and transport the materials to the trucks. All electronics can be accepted for recycling with the exception of TVs and computer monitors. The secure document destruction takes place immediately on site in a mobile shredding truck. This event will be open to all Mountain Brook residents and businesses.

E-911 Information

Did you know that the first 911 call in the United States was made on February 16, 1968, in Haleyville, Alabama? When calling 911 on your cell phone, please pay attention to how the person answering the call responds. Jurisdictional lines for call centers are very irregular and it is possible that the Call Center



answering your cell call is not the one you want to get the help you need. When calling from a cell phone, always try to give the operator an exact location of where you are so that the call can be directed to the appropriate agency for a timely response.

It is also a good idea to make a test 911 call annually from your land line. Just dial (205) 802-2414, select "press 1" when the dispatcher answers, tell them you want to make a test 911 call to verify your name and address as shown in our 911 systems. Make the 911 call to make sure it is correct. If you live in Mountain Brook and another agency answers, notify them of your address and you were trying to reach Mountain Brook 911. We will work with 911 to correct the problem.

If you call 911 by mistake, do not hang up. Make the dispatcher aware that it was an accident and that there is no emergency. Regardless, we will dispatch a car to your location to be sure you are OK. If it is an emergency, try to remain calm and speak clearly when giving information to the 911 operator. This will assist them in getting the appropriate help and personnel more quickly. Seconds can make a difference!

PUBLIC WORKS

Loose Leaf Collection Final Round

City crews are in the fourth and final round of leaf collection and should be finished by March 1, 2024. This is year two since the decision was made to no longer outsource the contract for this service and instead have our City staff collect the loose leaves. The first year that our Public Works Department took on this task was much improved from recent years. With the first year equipment, staffing, and learning curve behind us, the second year has been nearly flawless.

Leaves brought to the curb after the beginning of the final round must be bagged for collection. Bagged leaves will be serviced on your regularly-scheduled trash collection day.

The City recycles the loose leaves collected each year to produce compost.

Citizens of Mountain Brook may come to the

Public Works facility, 3579 East Street near Rathmell Soccer complex, and receive the compost at no charge if they load themselves. Public Works employees will load them mechanically for a fee of \$20.00 per pickup load. Non-residents may purchase the compost for \$15.00 if they load themselves. Public Work employees will load them for \$20.00 per pickup load or \$30.00 per scoop to load larger trucks.

The compost operation is available Tuesday through Friday 7:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. - 3:30 p.m. If you have questions regarding compost, you may contact Mountain Brook Public Works at (205) 802-2390.

Waste Service Information

s we head into 2024, here are a few waste collection is providing solid waste, recycling, debris, and bulk trash service for the City of Mountain Brook. Household waste is collected twice per week - Monday through Saturday. Please place garbage cans where they are accessible and not behind mailboxes, power poles, signs and trees. Your first collection of the week will be household garbage and recycling. Yard waste should NOT be included in this collection. All household garbage and recycling should be bagged and BOXES BROKEN DOWN to minimize litter during collection. Please have your cart out for service by 6:30 a.m. on your scheduled service day. Everything collected that day will be transported to RePower South and sorted. On the second collection of the week, if space allows, place small limbs or bagged yard waste in the cart along with your household garbage. Everything collected that day will be taken to the landfill. No single bag/container may exceed 50 lbs. Please ensure the lid is closed to prevent wind-blown litter and animal nuisance. Residents using the backdoor pickup need to take oversized, bulk boxes to the curb for pickup.

Homeowner-generated yard waste will continue to be collected Monday through Friday. Place materials no more than 3 feet from the curb and away from obstructions such as power poles, trees, and wires. Branches may not be longer than 6 feet, and cross ties (railroad ties) will not be collected, as they contain creosote and are not accepted by landfills. Construction materials WILL NOT be collected.

Any tree cutting and trimming work done by a contractor MUST be removed by the contractor. Your contractor should be licensed in Mountain Brook, and if so, they will be aware of the contractor requirements and will know they are responsible for removal.



Please break down your boxes for pick-up and put them in your bin.

City staff are picking up loose leaves until March. You can check the city website for your collection dates or call Public Works at (205) 802-2390. Please have your leaves at the curb prior to the beginning of a round. Please only place leaves at the curb for this collection, and do not include items such as branches, rocks, or bags within the leaf piles. Also, please do not have your leaf piles staged in close proximity to the storm drains. Leaves brought out after the beginning of the final round must be bagged for collection. If you choose to bag your leaves, then your bagged leaves will be serviced on your regularly scheduled trash collection day.

US-280 Ramps/Cahaba Road/ Lane Park Road/Culver Road Roundabouts

The proposed roundabouts at the intersection of the US-280 ramps, Cahaba Road, Lane Park Road, and Culver Road should begin soon. Design is complete, but delays have been encountered with utilities and finalizing the transfer of right-of-way needed within the City of Birmingham. As soon as these items are resolved and final approvals are received, the project will be bid for construction by ALDOT. We anticipate this will occur in spring of 2024, with construction and utility relocations beginning in the summer.

We understand there has been lots of ongoing construction within this area, and although the project will have an impact on travelers, we will do our best to minimize that disruption. Much of the construction will be done at night to avoid daytime lane closures during the week, and the intersection will remain open to traffic at all times. Upon completion, this project will create a welcoming gateway into the City, with landscaping and lighting improvements surrounding the roundabouts.

Montclair Road Sidewalk

Design is currently underway and is approximately 50% complete for proposed sidewalk improvements along Montclair Road. The City of Mountain Brook received an award of federal Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) funding for the project, which will extend from Country Club Road (Ramsey Park) to Mountain Brook Park Drive. Most of the new sidewalk will be constructed along Montclair Road, although a short segment will be constructed along Shannon Lane to tie to the existing sidewalk on Memory Lane. Construction is anticipated to begin in fall of 2024, depending on the time required to get the needed approvals from ALDOT.





Mountain Brook Recognized as a Tree City

The City has applied for recertification as a nationally recognized "Tree City" for the 30th consecutive year, as well as the even more prestigious "Growth Award", which Mountain Brook has received for the last 22 years due to the efforts of the Board of Landscape Design and our city arborists. This would not be the case, if not for a committed and supportive Mayor, City Council, and City Manager. If you happen to run into any of them be sure to thank them for their efforts!



New Trees Coming To Fairway Drive

In mid to late January, the island along Fairway Drive will be spruced up with the addition of eight new Nuttall Oak trees. The project, spearheaded by the Country Club Gardeners, replaces several decaying trees within the scenic island divider along the road. The garden club raised a portion of the funds with the City of Mountain Brook's Board of Landscape Design matching the remainder for completion. In coordination with Parks & Recreation Superintendent Shanda Williams, CPRP, the Nuttall Oak was selected as it grows quickly with a good branching structure. This species of Oak works well as a street tree or shade tree making it ideal for this location. The new trees will also put on quite a show in the fall as the leaves turn yellow to orange to red.

Alabama Veteran's Memorial Park

This past November the Alabama Veteran's Memorial Park was added as the City of Mountain Brook's newest park. Located next to the High School adjacent to the campus off I-459, it is home to a beautiful and humbling memorial honoring our fallen heroes and a majestically large American flag that can be seen for miles from I-459. These emotionally moving points of interest are at the end of a 1,000 ft brick paved trail through the tranquil woods. The 22-acre property has potential for additional passive recreational opportunities. We are excited to continue the patriotic traditions that have been developed there and establish this as one of our signature parks. If you have never been before, we encourage you to visit and be in awe of of everything you see there from the walk through nature to the thousands of names engraved on the memorial. Robot Mower at Crestline Elementary

ountain Brook Parks and Recreation is trying out a new robot mower on the field at Crestline Elementary. This mower is very similar to the Roomba vacuums that are now common in households. The mower is battery operated and makes virtually no noise, which fits in perfectly with the City's initiative to reduce noise pollution. It will be docked at the charging station under the scoreboards during the day and will be programmed to deploy at night to cut the grass when no one should be on the field. It operates by GPS navigation with programmed boundaries. It will cut in straight lines and work its way across the field, getting as much done in the time period alotted. If it doesn't finish, it will pick up where it left off the next time it deploys and then start over in a new direction.

Our hope is that this mower will keep up with the demands of the growing grass and keep a consistent finished look to the field. This will keep us from having to inconvenience the PE classes with our large red mowers on the fields during school hours, and allow us to focus on other details of the field. Other benefits include less compaction because this mower is lighter. It will be able to mow when the fields are too soft for regular mowers, and it will also reduce our needs for aeration and chemicals. It will be able to mow more frequently which should help with some weed control and prevent clumping of the grass clippings too. We are hoping this leads to a healthier, more beautiful field for schools and sports while reducing maintenance costs.

We encourage people to look at the mower and watch it run, but please do not touch it. Tampering with it can set off alarms or prevent it from successfully completing its daily task. We would also appreciate your help in keeping the field clear of trash and obstacles to get a good cut without damaging the mower. This is a trial run and if successful, more robot mowers will be added to other fields in the future.



Jr. High Turf Field

The new athletic facility at the Junior High is complete with a brand new artifical turf football/lacrosse field, four new tennis courts, two restrooms, and additional parking. This was our most used field and it had so much going against it. It was shaded, small, and had the most foot traffic than any of our other fields. It was really hard to keep the grass in good shape and safe to use. Maximizing

the use of the limited space has been a goal of the City over the last few years and this project did just that! The football field was finished this past fall in time for the Junior High football team to practice on it, and now Mountain Brook Lacrosse is using it for their spring season. We are looking forward to another successful season and this time, with no rain outs!

Jemison Park Renovations

The City of Mountain Brook and The Friends of Jemison Park recently completed the \$3 million renovation project for Jemison Park.

A new 9' wide asphalt trail replaced the existing narrow concrete trail and follows a route closer to Shades Creek giving park visitors closer access to the stream. The trail runs 1.1 miles from the park entrance at Cahaba Road to the Park Brook Road entrance. This main trail as well as access to the picnic terrace and parking areas are designed to be accessible for visitors with disabilities.

Parking throughout the park was updated with new sidewalks and additional spaces plus paved connectors to the main trail. Eleven new parking spaces were added bringing total parking to 68 spaces distributed along the length of the park.

A new trail, Chief's Trail, was added to the west side of Shades Creek. This one- way gravel trail travels along the steep slopes above Shades Creek. The trail runs a third of a mile through mature woods. Because this area lies well above the floodplain of Shades Creek, trail walkers can experience a



different native greenspace from the main trail.

Drainageways through the park received special attention. Some of the more eroded drainage ways were gently regraded to slow erosion. Other areas were regraded to direct water away from the new trail and to provide filtration areas to allow water to filter naturally into the soil. The drainage ways were seeded with a custom seed mix designed to replicate the native plants in Jemison Park.

A new stone picnic terrace with new tables and benches gives visitors a place to eat that is accessible by a paved

trail from the parking area. Visitors may also notice all the existing park benches were refurbished and reinstalled in locations along the creek. In the next few years, the Parks and Recreation Department and Friends of Jemison Park will be adding additional native trees and understory plantings in the park.

The Friends of Jemison Park played a major role in both design direction and in funding for the improvements. The Friends are currently raising additional funds to build a second pedestrian bridge over Shades Creek to connect the south end of Chief's Trail back to the main trail in a loop. Anyone who wishes to learn more about the Friends of Jemison Park or contribute to the bridge and future projects in the park can learn more at www.friendsofjemisonpark.org.

The City of Mountain Brook and the Friends of Jemison Park jointly funded the project. C.S. Beatty Construction, Inc. was the General Contractor. Park improvements were designed by Nimrod Long and Associates, Inc.



Under the Mountain



Originally from New York, Cesare attended Boston University where he studied English and film. Cesare's love for both mediums inform his work: his 2012 novella Tribesmen follows a doomed Italian film crew in the 1970s who travel to a remote island where they plan to make a cheap horror; his upcoming Clown in the Cornfield 3: The Church of Frendo, despite its tongue-in-cheek title, takes a more literary approach to the notion of what a slasher series can do, exploring the dangers of how we view others through forms of mass communication. In the ten years in between, Cesare has published nine books, worked in comic books for well-loved franchises such as The Dark

Crystal and Adventure Time, and won the Bram Stoker Award for Superior Achievement in a Young Adult Novel for his breakout release, Clown in a Cornfield. He has also written screenplays, including the upcoming adaptation of Clown in a Cornfield, which is being produced by Temple Hill Entertainment, the same company that released Smile (2022) and Stephen King's The Outsider.

Adam Cesare will be visiting the O'Neal Library on Saturday, March 23 at 7pm, as a guest of the library's monthly horror movie screening/author event series, Under the Mountain. This event is free and open to the public, with a book signing to follow. through our Challenge Yourself program series, which we were able to host thanks to O'Neal on Overton: they collected canned food, read books with rising K-2 students, and made pet toys for the Humane Society." said Michelle Cheng, Head of the Young Adult Department.

The Mountain Brook Fire Department invested much time and energy in helping the Library during and after the flood this summer. The Library is extremely grateful for the cheerful, cooperative spirit of Chief Mullins and his command staff and firemen.




