One thing I've always loved about going to the library is a quiet experience. It feels almost like a sanctuary. Over a year ago we started a project I call 'Quiet Villages' where we replaced extremely loud gas blowers with almost unnoticeable battery-powered blowers. If you haven't noticed...well, that's the point. The city's commitment to electricpowered equipment in our villages and parks continues to grow. We are the first city in the south to receive the American Green Zone Alliance (AGZA) certification and received a nice write-up in the Washington Post about our efforts. Evolving technology in batteries and electric engines will allow us to continue to better serve our community in the future.

The city's commitment was phase one. Now, as part of phase two, we are asking our schools and village business owners to join the Quiet Villages movement. When we approached Will Newton, president of Landscape Services, he immediately embraced our initiative and now uses electric-powered blowers throughout our villages for the services we contract through him. We received the same response from one of Mountain Brook's major commercial home landscape provider's, Daniel Samford, of GREEN Landscaping. I should note that during the heaviest leaf season, a gas blower must occasionally be used.

For phase three, I would ask for your help. If you use a landscape service company, ask them to use electric equipment. If you are a do-ityourselfer, consider purchasing electric equipment on your next purchase. Little Hardware has a wide array of excellent choices. Working together, we can create a quiet, pollution-free community for the enjoyment of all of us and our many visitors.





Electronics Recycling and Paper Shredding Day

The City of Mountain Brook is set to hold its 2nd annual electronic waste and paper shredding day. The event will take place on April 23rd, 2022 at Mountain Brook High School from 9 am to 1 pm. This past year over 500 people participated in this event with more than 20,000 lbs. of paper and 30,000 lbs. of electronics being

dropped off for disposal.

The City is happy to once again partner with Gone For Good, a program of the local non-profit United Ability, to service the event. It will feature on-site secure paper document destruction trucks in addition to an environmentally friendly way to dispose of most electronics.

The event will feature a drive thru drop off and volunteers will help remove items from residents' vehicles and transport the materials to the trucks. This event will be open to Mountain Brook residents and businesses.

New Police Chief Named



Chief James "Jaye" A. Loggins was formally named as the 6th Chief of Police of the City on Monday, October 25, 2021. Chief Loggins served as Deputy Chief under Chief Ted Cook's (MBPD 5th Chief of Police) Administration. He also briefly served as the Acting Chief of Police following Chief Cook's retirement announcement. Chief Loggins is no stranger to the Mountain Brook Police Department and has been serving with the Department since 1996. He has served and supervised in every division throughout the department; including promotion to executive management and oversight of the daily operations of the Agency at the ranks of Captain and Deputy Chief.

Chief Loggins graduated from the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) with a degree in Justice Science in 2001. Loggins will also receive his Master's Degree in Criminal Justice from Jacksonville State University in 2022. Chief Loggins is a recipient of the FBI LEEDA (Law Enforcement Executive Development Academy) Trilogy Award and is a graduate of FBI L.E.E.D.S. He has also completed the APSLA (Alabama Public Safety Leadership Academy) and MPACT (The Managers Preparing to Accomplish Change Today) Programs. Chief Loggins graduated from the Alabama Advanced Criminal Justice Academy (AACJA) at the Montgomery Police Department in 1996. Since becoming a member of the force, his leadership and skills have been recognized by the Agency as a tremendous asset - earning him several awards including the rare feat, "Officer of the Year" twice. Chief Loggins was a longstanding member of the Tactical Operations Unit where he received advanced training at the federal, state, and local levels as a Certified Tactical Operator.

Chief Loggins expresses his appreciation to the City Leadership for entrusting him with the safety and security of the citizens of Mountain Brook. He would also like to thank Chief Cook for his mentorship and lasting friendship over the years.

Chief Loggins looks forward to continuing to exceed the expectation demanded of this agency by its citizens.

Mountain Brook Dispatch Services Contracted to Shelby County 911



In an effort to provide better telecommunications services to the Mountain Brook Public Safety partners and to the residents of Mountain Brook, an out of state consulting firm was contracted to examine the services and make-up of the Mountain Brook Public Safety 911 Center. The study was conducted over several months and was completed in February 2021. The results of the study provided a recommendation of outsourcing the dispatch services to Shelby County 911. The Mountain Brook Emergency Communications District entered into a contract with Shelby County Emergency Management Communications District in July 2021. The contract and move of the services were approved by the Personnel Board of Jefferson County. Since, much planning and preparation have taken place to ensure that the highest level of services are maintained and provided to the residents of Mountain Brook.

The outsourcing of the services resulted in a reduction in force of eleven (11) positions in the Mountain Brook Public Safety 911 Center. Those employees affected were provided assistance in seeking employment with other 911 Centers and a generous severance package which included a one- time payment compensation and continued insurance coverage for up to three months. The outsourcing also resulted in an expected cost savings to the city without a loss of the level of service currently provided. Shelby County 911 recently moved into a state of the art communications building with the most up to date equipment and technology.



There will not be any change in the way residents reach Mountain Brook Public Safety. The same telephone numbers will allow residents and those needing public safety will remain the same. Those numbers are 911 for emergencies and 205-802-2414 and select "press 2" for non-emergency. We are excited about the partnership with Shelby County 911 and the professional services they provide. The call taking and dispatch services took effect January 10, 2022.

Athletic Improvements

- This Spring, the following improvements to the Mountain Brook sports facilities will be completed for our youth:
- The field at Cherokee Bend Elementary has been completely renovated. Upgrades include new lights, fencing, netting, landscaping a new restroom

facility. Thanks to Duncan & Thompson Construction Services for completing this project.

• The Mountain Brook Athletic Complex will open a brand new plaza to complement its recently installed turf fields. The new plaza features new restrooms, a new concession stand,

covered batting cages, a playground and new viewing areas. Thanks to Clements Dean Building Company for an outstanding job in completing this project.

• Field 1 at the Mountain Brook Athletic Complex is currently being transformed into a new turfed field that will be a

mini complex in and of itself. Once complete, Field 1 will accommodate multiple age groups by having smaller fields built into the outfield corners of the larger turf field. Special thanks to Morris-Shea Bridge Company for their hard work in completing this great project.



New Dog Park

Mountain Brook now has a new dog park by Mountain Brook Elementary. This is all thanks to Grayson Hydinger and the hard work he has put in to complete his Eagle Scout project. Grayson, a scout with Troop 86, chartered by St. Luke's Church, first approached the city about the idea in November 2019 and diligently worked on his plan throughout the Covid pandemic. He presented his plan to the Board of Education, the Park Board, the Planning Commission, and the City Council to receive permission to build the dog park. With each meeting, support for this project grew as everyone was impressed by Grayson's drive and his ability to fill a need for a dog park in this community

The dog park is located in the wooded area beside the Mountain Brook Elementary athletic field. Grayson raised over \$7,500 in donations and led a team of volunteers to clear the weedy undergrowth and re-route the nature trail to open the area to give dogs the most room possible. 
Terry, the 2013 City Employee of the Year, will be missed, but we wish him the very best in retirement.

MBS Student Success Continues in 2021 Report

Mountain Brook students continued the trend of academic success in the 2020-21 school year despite all the adverse circumstances due to COVID. On Monday October 18, 2021, Dr. Missy Brooks, Director of Curriculum and Instruction, presented the Board of Education with the annual Student Assessment Report.

Mountain Brook students were above the national average in all test categories. The PreACT is given to sophomores in the fall. It is on a scale of 1-35. In October 2020, Mountain Brook students averaged a score of 22.1 which is higher than last year's national average of 18.7.

On the ACT plus writing (given to juniors in the spring - scale of 1-36), Mountain Brook students averaged a 25.3 which is higher than the national average of 20.7 and the Alabama state average, 18.9.

Eighty-three percent (928 out of 1,118) of Mountain Brook students who took Advanced Placement (AP) classes scored a three or higher last year. A three or higher earns college credit. Globally, 64% recorded a three or higher on their AP tests last year placing Mountain Brook 19 percent above the global percentage.

"Our students do exceptionally well year in and year out," Brooks said. "This is due to the teaching they receive as well as their commitment to excellence in the classroom."
