




Tho in the world is mowing lawns W in the middle of the night in our city?

As crazy as this sounds, the answer is, "We are!" Parks and Recreation Director, Shanda Williams, is helping transform Mountain Brook into a 'quiet' community. She, along with Public Works Director, Ronnie Vaughn, have converted to electric blowers for our villages and parks. So, the loud sound you don't hear is them blowing leaves. We have a third-party vendor doing some of our blowing (with gas blowers) in the villages and we are working with them to 'go green' as well. They may occasionally have to use a gas blower for heavy, wet leaves during winter

What's the deal with the middle-of-thenight mowing? Shanda recently ordered a very sophisticated robotic lawn mower. It uses GPS guidance to map out the area to be mowed. It has its own charging 'house' and mows (quietly!) in the middle

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of the night and then returns to the house for recharging! Additionally, Shanda has a riding electric mower/blower her folks use for some of our park and field work.

Shanda: "These mowers will not only save on gas, emissions, and noise, but they will reduce the man hours needed to maintain the fields and those employees will be able to focus on other, much needed, tasks. We expect the fields to always look clean cut and be much healthier because of the reduced compaction from our larger mowers. As we learn more about these mowers, we hope to deploy them on some of our other fields."

All of this activity is part of a bigger picture we are

working on to transition to an eco-friendlier community and plays well into our Bee City, Tree City, and Monarch Butterfly initiatives. We are in the early stages of forming a Sustainability Committee to help shepherd and coordinate these various activities.



2024 City Budget

The City's fiscal year runs from October 1 through September 30. At its September 25th meeting, the City Council adopted the 2024 budget. The General Fund budget reflects a surplus of \$533,000 from revenue totaling \$50.3 million. The projected fund balance at September 30, 2024 of \$20.6 million approximates six months of General Fund expenses totaling \$44 million. Some of the notable General Fund revenues include:

The chart below depicts the relative importance of the various sources of revenue in the General Fund:





2024 General Fund expenses and transfers total \$50 million, which represents a 6.2% increase from last year's budget. The charts below illustrate the functional and departmental allocation of the City's General Fund expenses:

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Business License Renewals

Business license renewals for the City of Mountain Brook are due on January 1, 2024 and will be delinquent January 31, 2024. Licenses not renewed timely will be subject to penalties and interest.

Business owners should receive a renewal reminder prior to January. If you do not receive your renewal notice prior to Jan. 1, please inform the Revenue Department. Please complete the renewal notice and return along with your payment.

Remember, if you pay for your renewal online, the amount that is already populated is only the issue fee, not the total license fee. Many of the license fees are based on your last year's gross receipts and require you to input that amount in order to calculate the correct license fee.

If your business receives a renewal notice and you are no longer conducting business in the City, please mark the renewal notice with the ending date of the business and mail it back or fax to 205-870-3590 so that we may update our files.

Holiday Safety Tips from MBPD

With the holiday season fast approaching it is especially important for each of us to be cautious and alert when shopping. Crime typically tends to increase significantly during the holiday season. There are steps you can take to significantly reduce your chances of becoming a victim:

- Use debit or credit cards if possible. Or, carry just enough cash to pay for your errands. If you must carry large amounts of cash, separate it into amounts needed and place in different pockets.
- Be careful using ATM machines. Use them in populated places and
- constantly pay attention to what is going on around you.
- If you have to carry a purse, carry it close to your body. Always keep it zipped or fastened.
- Park as close as you can to the mall or store where you will be shopping.Park only in well-lit areas if possible.
- Have your keys ready to open your vehicle before you exit the store.
- Remember exactly where you parked.
- When you are hurried or in a crowded shop, make sure you get all forms of ID and credit cards returned to you before leaving.
- Use an escort or store security if you have too many packages or if you

are leaving after store closing times.

- Keep gifts or packages out of plain view inside your vehicle.
- Keep gifts hidden from view through outside windows of your residence.
- After opening gifts, break down boxes and packaging of expensive items such as electronics or from high-end stores. Put them in plastic bags to hide the fact that you have valuable new items in your home.
- Carry a cell phone and have emergency numbers readily available.

Remember that practicing these steps can go a long way in ensuring that you and your loved ones are not easy targets for would be robbers and thieves. If we all practice due diligence throughout the holiday season, we can greatly reduce the chances of being taken advantage of during what should be a joyous time of year.

Pedestrian Safety

Mountain Brook citizens and visitors enjoy walking through our villages and along our many miles of sidewalks every day. Although Alabama laws exist to protect pedestrians, safety is a shared responsibility between those on foot and those operating motor vehicles.

Who has the Right of Way?

Pedestrians often have the right of way, but there are certain scenarios when they must yield to oncoming traffic. Pedestrians always have the right of way when they are on a sidewalk. When crossing a roadway at an intersection with a signal that indicates "walk," motorists must yield to pedestrians within the crosswalk. However, pedestrians may not suddenly step off the curb and walk into the path of a vehicle creating an immediate hazard. If no traffic controls are present at an intersection, or they are not functioning, motorists must yield the right of way to pedestrians crossing within a crosswalk. Finally, pedestrians must yield to oncoming traffic if crossing the roadway at any point outside of a crosswalk.

What do Alabama State Laws say about sidewalks?

Pedestrians are required to utilize a sidewalk at all times when one is available. When traveling on a roadway without a



sidewalk, a pedestrian must walk on the shoulder or as close to the edge of the roadway as possible. Alabama State Law advises that pedestrians walk on the left side of a roadway, or facing oncoming traffic.

How can you keep yourself safe when walking through Mountain Brook?

- *Follow Alabama Laws:* Cross roadways in marked crosswalks and utilize sidewalks when possible.
- Be Visible: Wear reflective clothing and gear at night and

brightly colored clothing in the daytime.

- Make Eye Contact: Never assume a driver sees you, even if you are crossing roadways in marked crosswalks.
- **Be Intentional:** When driving, especially in one of the villages, intentionally look for pedestrians and proceed with caution.

Five Fun Facts About Trees

Trees are the longest living organisms on Earth, and never die of old age. California holds the record for the oldest living trees. Some of the state's bristlecone pines and giant sequoias are 4,000-5,000 years old. Methuselah, an estimated 4,852-year-old ancient Bristlecone Pine, is one of the oldest living trees in the world.

Some trees have been to the moon.

"Moon trees" were grown from seeds taken to the moon during the Apollo 14 mission in early 1971. NASA and the US Forest Service wanted to see if the moon's orbit caused the seeds to grow differently back on earth. These trees were donated to state forestry services in 1975 and 1976.

Trees are able to communicate and defend themselves against attacking insects. Scientists have found that trees can flood their leaves with chemicals called phenolics when the insects begin their raid. They can also signal danger to other trees so they can start their own defense. Willow trees, for example, emit certain chemicals when they're attacked by webworms. Other willows then produce more tannin, making their leaves harder for the pests to digest.

Trees can help you find your way if you are lost in the woods

In northern temperate climates, moss will grow on the northern side of the tree trunk, where there is more shade. Also, a tree's rings can help point you in the right direction too. If you're in the northern hemisphere, you can see the rings of the tree grow slightly thicker on the southern side since it receives more light. In the southern hemisphere, the opposite is true, with rings being thicker on the north side.

Different parts of a tree grow at different times throughout the year.

Typically, most of the foliage growth happens in the spring, followed by trunk growth in the summer and root growth in the fall and winter.



Jemison Park Renovations

ast summer, Mountain Brook broke ground on the city's \$3million renovation project for Jemison Park. The project includes a new nine (9) foot wide asphalt trail to replace the existing narrow concrete trail, improvement to the picnic area and additional parking. General Contractor C.S. Beatty Construction is making good progress and the project is on track to be complete in January 2024.

Throughout the summer and early fall, workers removed the old concrete sidewalk and began laying the new asphalt trail. You may have noticed the orange fencing crisscrossing the length of the park – it shows the limits where the contractor is allowed to operate within the park and provides a visual edge to protect the trees when heavy equipment is being used.

Work over the summer included regrading some of the more eroded drainage ways and lining them with native stone to slow erosion. Where the old concrete walks are removed, the ground will be gently regraded to direct water away from the new trail and allow it to filter naturally




New asphalt trail brings trail users away from Mountain Brook Parkway and closer to Shades Creek.

into the soil. Once grading is finished, the disturbed soil will be sowed with a custom seed mix designed to replicate the native plants in Jemison Park.

All the existing benches in the park were removed to prevent them from being damaged during construction. At the end of the project, the benches will be reinstalled at or very near their original locations. In the picnic area, tables will be replaced with new furniture on a new stone terrace.

In the coming month, work will shift to the Overbrook Road park entrance. Work will include building an accessible route from the Overbrook Road area parking to the trail. The new approach will follow the same route but have a gentler slope. New railing will protect children, people with strollers and those with mobility aids from the steep embankment to Shades Creek. The project is jointly funded by the City of Mountain Brook and the Friends of Jemison Park.



New smaller paths link parking areas to the main trail.




Sidewalk Projects Wrapping Up


The City of Mountain Brook is currently completing two sidewalk extension projects. The council approved an extension of sidewalks on Locksley Drive and also along Brookwood Road.

The Locksley Drive sidewalk project extended the sidewalk from Dunbarton Drive to Warrington Road. This sidewalk addition was constructed by city staff and was approximately 2,800 feet in length. The project was completed the first week of October and has already been very busy with a steady flow of walkers.

The Brookwood Road sidewalk project was opened for bid and the contractor for this work was Gillespie Construction. The project extension was ninety percent completed the first week of October but has been temporarily held up by utility relocation (water meters). Hopefully this hold up will be resolved very soon. This project along Brookwood Road extends the sidewalk from Crosshill Road heading east towards Brookleeds Road and ends at the driveway of 3633 Brookwood Road.

Please only place leaves at the curb for collection, and do not include items such as branches, rocks, or bags within the leaf piles. Also, please do not have your leaf piles staged in close proximity to the storm drains. If leaves are not out prior to the date of your scheduled collections, then your service will take place during the next scheduled round for your area.

Leaves brought out after the beginning of the final round must be bagged for collection. If you choose to bag your leaves, then your bagged leaves will be serviced on your regularly scheduled trash collection day.
